


2013 Holiday Potluck

Timeless Information

I was looking through an old issue of "The News Basket" from June 1988 when I ran across an article by Ellen Clague, a basket artist from Connecticut. Following is an excerpt from her article titled "Asking Color Questions." Let us know if you want to see more on this subject

What's Wrong With This Picture?

There are some basic areas of color use that I think give all of us trouble the most often. I want to discuss a few questions you can ask yourself when something just isn't quite right with your basket. A sort of "What's wrong with this picture?" exercise. Not too long ago I belonged to a cooperative studio. One of the things I miss most about it are the critiques exchanged between artists when one of us called for help. There seems to be a point in every project when we're ready to toss it in the fire. The person who consistently helped me the most would always toss the issue right back in my lap with a "What seems wrong to you?" ..and then a "Why?" This 'learning to ask the right questions' helps me now when I am alone in the studio with my problem piece.

Squint

WHY IS THAT COLOR JUMPING RIGHT OFF OF THE BASKET? One of the first things to do, especially when dealing with a color problem, is to squint at your piece. The thing that is out of kilter will jump out at you. The place to look for the answer would probably be in a value study. Value is the relative lightness or darkness of a color. When one of your colors is a <u>very different</u> value from the rest, it may not settle in comfortably in your piece. Solutions could be—changing the color itself or changing the amount used. The theory of extension is a reminder that it will take a very small amount of yellow (for example) to balance a deep purple. Black and white photos are a good way to study value without the distraction of color. Squint at the picture and you will soon learn to see value. Close value, low contrast works are mellow. High contrast pieces, with widely different values, have a dynamic feel. Study the relationship of lights and darks in works you admire.

WHY DOESN'T MY EMBELLISHMENT SHOW UP? Value is probably the culprit. Higher contrast is probably needed. Study pictures of African and Indian baskets which very often have designs done in colors with high contrast of light and dark. The execution is clean and crisp and the designs "read" beautifully.

GBB Minutes continued:


